#### MANAGE AND OWN THE PROCESS YOURSELF

- Decide on final list of colleges (4-6 recommended).
- Obtain the college applications.
- Complete the applications.
- Organize and secure other information required.

## Deciding Where To Apply

- It's about personal '**FIT**" (size, population, setting, programs, etc.)
- Final list must include a combination of:
  - Reach schools (1-2)
  - Match schools (1-2)
  - Safety schools (1-2)

## Admission Options

- Rolling Admissions apply in the fall/early winter and receive decision within 8 weeks after application is submitted.
- Early Action/Priority apply in the fall (occasionally early winter) and receive a decision in the winter. Applying by a priority deadline can often give a student an advantage when space is limited.
- Regular Decision apply in the fall/early winter and receive decision on a specific date in the spring.
- ALL OF THE ABOVE ARE NON-BINDING MAY 1<sup>st</sup> DECISIONS

## Binding Admission Options

- Early Decision students make a commitment to a first-choice institution where, if admitted, they will definitely enroll. The application and decision deadline occur early. Commitment is BINDING.
- Restrictive Early Action apply in the fall, admitted in early winter, student has until May 1<sup>st</sup> to deposit. Commitment is non-binding.
  - Can usually only apply to one private school REA

\*Students may only submit 1 application Early Decision or Restrictive Early Action

#### Early Decision (ED) & Restrictive Early Action (REA)

- ED and REA policies are taken very seriously by colleges.
- Be sure you know the expectations within each school's policies.
- If unsure, PLEASE speak with the college admissions representative from that school.
- Students should work with counselors throughout this process.

#### Pieces Of The College Application

- Completed application
- Application fee credit card, check or fee waiver request
- Official transcript (Parchment)
- Test scores
- Letter of Recommendation
  - 2-3 weeks in advance
  - Teacher
  - Counselor and/or Secondary School Report
- Essay
- Auditions/Portfolios (if applicable)
- Interviews (optional)



## Applications

- Applications are available on college websites.
- Keep track of username and password for each.



- Common Application used by 900 colleges and universities across the country
  - Create an account at www.commonapp.org
  - Large FAQ section and video tutorials
  - Most schools have individual supplements which must be submitted
- Coalition Application
  - Newer application type that allows students to apply to multiple colleges, similar to Common App
  - 135 schools across the country
- No preference on which application is completed.

## Applications

- School Forms on Common Application
  - *'Invite' teacher(s) to write a recommendation*
  - This initiates process for teachers, who can then submit letters online or on paper
  - 'Invite' your counselor KEY STEP allows counselor to submit your school forms online
    - Transcripts will then be sent for all schools applying under the Common Application

#### MEET WITH YOUR TEACHER/COUNSELOR BEFORE YOU INVITE THEM!

#### Extra Information For The Common Application

- Class rank reporting = NONE
- Graduating Class Size: 542
- Counselor's Fax Number (847) 755-4904
- Each class per semester = .5 credit
- Graduation Date = May 24, 2022
- GPA Scale = 4.0 (ALWAYS)
- We strongly recommend that students waive their right to access any letters of recommendation submitted on their behalf.

#### Transcripts

- Official Transcripts must be requested online at Parchment.com Student email accounts have additional information.
- Give at least 5 days notice to receive a Transcript Be mindful of Thanksgiving and Winter Break.
- Transcripts will be sent directly to the school OR you can request to pick up the transcript (i.e. local scholarship applications).
- Some schools have "self-reporting" transcript process.
- Only send transcripts when necessary.
- Beginning in 2012-13 school year, District 211 eliminated class rank from report cards and transcripts.
- This information is clearly stated in our School Profile, which is attached to every transcript that we send to schools.

#### Test Scores

- ACT/SAT scores may be on school transcripts.
- Most colleges/universities request testing scores be sent directly from testing agency.
  - www.actstudent.org
  - www.collegeboard.org
- May take 3 6 weeks so request scores early.
- If taking SAT this Fall, consider sending one score now if it falls within publish range.
- Some schools may not consider application complete without a testing score.
- Most schools will take either the ACT or SAT.

#### Letters of Recommendation

- Check to see if you even need a letter to be sent before requesting.
- Ask teachers/counselors at least 3 weeks before any deadline.
- Complete "Recommendation Letter Request" through Google.
- Don't forget to write/email "thank you" to each recommender.
- If schools don't require a recommendation don't send one!
  - U of I example



#### The Essay

- Aside from your transcript and test scores the essay/personal statement is the most important part of your application.
- Your essays are a chance for you to give admission officers a better idea of your character and strengths.
  - What makes you different?
  - What experiences can you share?
- Remember to proofread your essays carefully before you send them out.
- Use English Tutoring and/or your English teacher to help you proof your essay.

## **Application Fees**

- College Application Fees vary, but generally range from \$35 to \$50 to apply to each college.
- Fees are nonrefundable.
- Fee Waivers:
  - Students on free and reduced book/lunch program are eligible for Fee Waivers.
  - Families for whom the application fees are a hardship may be eligible for Fee Waivers.
  - Forms are available from your counselor and you should meet with your counselor to discuss eligibility.
