PLACEMENT EXAM

Incoming freshmen are required to complete a placement exam which assists in determining English, math, and science course placement along with identifying students for required participation in the Incoming Freshmen math and reading summer school programs. The fall administration is the first administration of the PreACT. PreACT assessments offer 8th, 9th, and 10th graders an early experience with ACT test items and provides a predicted ACT test score. The ACT serves as both a college entrance exam and is used by the State of Illinois as its mandated assessment for grade 11 students. Palatine High School will host its Class of 2029 Curriculum Night on Wednesday, December 11, 2024, from 6:00 - 8:00 p.m. Parents of enrolled students will receive more information about this event in November. The presentation will be available in Spanish.



ACTIVITIES AND ATHLETICS FAIR

Palatine High School will host the Activities and Athletics Fair in the Spring. Students and parents can explore and learn about all the athletic and activity opportunities. Coaches and sponsors will be available to meet students. In addition, families can register for summer athletic camps and submit the required school physical.

CLASS OF 2029 ORIENTATION SESSIONS

Facilitated by school counselors, these 90-minute orientation sessions provide small groups of participants with a deeper understanding of the school's curriculum, guidance service model, technology resources, and iPad distribution. MATH PLACEMENT

Math placement is finalized in the spring for all students initially placed into a math course of geometry or higher. Some students may be recommended for a summer school math class during the summer prior to their freshman year.

REGISTRATION INFORMATION

Registration occurs annually through Infinite Campus. During April, you will receive details about the registration process. Completing registration confirms your student intends to attend Palatine High School in the coming school year.

Registration fees may be waived for students who qualify for free or reduced price meal benefits. Applications for free or reduced-price meal benefits will be sent to families in July.

You will need to upload the following documents to Infinite Campus.

- Birth Certificate
- Proof of Residency can be demonstrated by providing one of the following original documents:
 - Current ComEd or Nicor utility bill in the parent's or legal guardian's name.
 - Current lease naming parent/guardian as a party to the lease.
 - Current property tax bill in the parent's or legal guardian's name.



2025-2026 Online Registration Opens May 1 School invoices mailed home September 2025

If you reside with someone else within our attendance boundaries, you will need to complete a residency affidavit. The affidavit must be completed and approved for your student to attend school.



Be Ready for the First Day of School

Complete Online Registration

 District 211 utilizes Infinite Campus (IC) as our student information system. Parents/guardians complete the online registration process within this system. IC logins affiliated with another school/district will not allow you to complete the registration process for District 211. You must establish a District 211 IC parent portal account.

Submit Physical Examination

• School physicals must be completed, submitted to the school nurse, and reviewed for meeting requirements prior to the start of school.

SUMMER SCHOOL

District 211's Summer School program includes academic courses and activity/athletic camps. Academic courses allow students to recover course credits, explore areas of career interest, and enhance academic skills. School activity and athletic camps provide an opportunity for students to strengthen skills and preparation for athletic/activity seasons and events.

FOOD & NUTRITION SERVICES AND MEAL/FEE WAIVER INFORMATION

Each July, the annual meal/fee waiver application is available for families interested in applying for benefits. If approved, students are eligible to receive free or reduced-price meals, as well as waiver of applicable school fees including instructional fees, Driver Education, PE uniforms and locks, AP testing, summer school tuition, and graduation cap and gown fees. A new application must be submitted annually to qualify.

District 211 cafeterias offer breakfast, lunch, and snack service daily. Menus and information on food & nutrition services is available online at <u>https://adc.d211.org/Page/6398</u>.



HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT 211 HAS A FIRST DAY Exclusion Policy. Students who are not in Compliance will not be able to attend school. Illinois School Code requires all incoming 9th graders to have a valid physical examination and upto-date immunization records on file with their high school prior to beginning freshman year.

Students cannot attend school unless these requirements are satisfied. The physical exam must be documented using the official State of Illinois form available on the District 211 website at <u>https://adc.d211.</u> <u>org/health-exam-form</u>. The physical must be completed within 12 months of the start of school which is on or after August 11, 2024.

Religious Exemptions to Required Immunizations

Families seeking a religious exemption from the immunization requirements must use the official Illinois Certificate of Religious Exemption to Required Immunizations and/or Examinations form. This form <u>must</u> be signed by a licensed medical physician.

School Health Services

Palatine High School's Health Services office is staffed by a school nurse and a health clerk who provide support for illnesses, known medical conditions, and injuries. In the event a student must be sent home from school for a medical reason, the Health Services office will notify the parent/guardian. In cases where the parent/guardian is unavailable, the office will contact an adult listed as an emergency contact on the student's school registration information. Please make sure emergency contact information is up to date.

The Health Services office will only administer prescription and non-prescription medications in school after the parent/guardian has provided a signed copy of the Authorization for Administration of Medication form. Families of students with chronic health conditions should contact the Health Services office to discuss appropriate accommodations for the student.

Required Dental Examination

All students in the Class of 2029 are required to provide proof that an oral health examination was completed by a licensed dentist between November 15, 2024 – May 15, 2026.

ACTIVITIES/ATHLETICS

Palatine High School values student involvement and participation in extracurricular activities including athletics, clubs, and the fine arts. These activities provide students opportunities for enrichment while also helping them to connect to their school community. All students are encouraged to join at least one of these groups.

Athletic and activity camps are part of the Palatine High School summer school program. Specific summer camp details will be sent to you in the spring as part of the summer school information packet. Students must have a valid physical on file with the nurse's office and be registered online to participate in these camps.

SPORTS PHYSICALS

Incoming 9th graders choosing to participate in a Palatine High School summer athletic camp, including pompoms and color guard, must provide evidence of a valid physical exam within the last 13 months prior to the start of the summer camp which is on or after May 2, 2024.



STUDENT SERVICES

The Student Services Department supports every Palatine High School student. Students are assigned a school counselor who serves as their main point of contact for all school-related matters throughout high school. Students can request an appointment with their school counselor during any non-academic period of the student's school day.

Counselors lead students through grade-specific activities and lessons during the school year. The activities, often provided in classroom settings, are designed to support student development in the areas of academic proficiency, post-high school planning, and social-emotional wellbeing.

Parents are encouraged to contact their child's school counselor anytime the parent seeks greater insight about their child's status in school. The counselor has access to a variety of resources to assist parents and can facilitate connections with others in the school as needed.

Registrar

The Registrar's Office maintains all permanent school records and manages the collection of students' grades at the conclusion of each semester. Permanent records are maintained for sixty years after a student graduates, transfers, or permanently withdraws from school.

Palatine High School uses Maia Learning, an online system to process requests from current high school students for school transcripts.

Student Support Teams

Palatine High School has assembled student support teams to best meet the needs of all students. Composed of an assistant principal, 2-3 school counselors, a psychologist, and a social worker, each team monitors students according to academic, behavior, and attendance factors. Any student displaying indicators of concern receives concentrated attention and support. The school counselor remains the best point of contact for any parent interested in knowing more about the student support team model.

ACADEMIC SUPPORTS AT PALATINE

At Palatine High School, we strive to provide academic support to all students, both inside and outside the classroom in order to enhance student success. While students are always encouraged to seek assistance from their academic teacher, a variety of resources are available for students seeking additional supports. Most teachers have an electronic learning management system such as Schoology that allows students to keep updated about class assignments and expectations.

Students are expected by both state and national policies to attain a certain level of achievement, students who are not meeting or not on track to meet these standards may be assigned additional academic support to allow them to meet these standards.

Counselor

Students work with their counselor to develop a personal academic plan based on their interests and goals. The counselor can also recommend other academic supports as needed.

Tutoring

Individual and small group tutoring in various subjects throughout the school day. Students are able to drop in for extra support as needed to ensure academic success. Students should ask their teacher for additional assistance or stop in the departmental offices to seek support in areas where regular tutors are not available.

Teachers in Math, Science and English are available throughout the school day in the Student Success Center (SSC) which is located in the Library. In addition teachers in Math, Science, English and Social Studies are available in the SSC before school from 7:15 - 8:15 a.m. Tuesday through Friday. After hours tutoring is available on Tuesday through Thursday until 4:30 p.m. in the SSC.

Media Center

The Palatine High School Media Center is a great location in the school where students can come to study, do research, check out books, or use the many available technology resources. The Media Center completed renovations in early 2017 and now includes the school's collection of thousands of books, available for checkout by students and staff. The Media Center also maintains an extensive listing of online research databases, available to students both on and off campus over the Internet. Students can also access hundreds of eBooks on their tablets and smartphones using District 211's <u>Overdrive</u> <u>and Open Ebooks online</u> libraries. The media Center is open from 7:15 a.m. - 6:00 p.m. Monday through Thursday. The media center closes right after school on Fridays.

Advanced Placement Supports

Students participating in one or more AP courses can receive additional support to boost their success. Students have access to tutoring and test prep materials, as well as to our AP support team who follows up with interested and/or struggling students to offer one-on-one coaching. Addition targeted first time AP tutoring is available as follows:

Test Make-Up

Students have access to make up tests and quizzes in our test make up room from 7:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. on all normal school days. Test Make-Up is located in the Media Center.

Required Supports

Students are expected by both state and national policies to attain a certain level of achievement, students who are not meeting or not on track to meet these standards may be assigned additional academic support to allow them to meet these standards.

Guided Study Hall

Students may be assigned to a Guided Study Hall. This study hall provides students with extra support in a smaller setting. In addition, students will work to develop study, organizational, and other academic skills.

ACT Prep

Students identified by their ACT test scores may be assigned to our ACT Prep program. During ½ of their lunch period, they will receive additional strategies and materials in a smaller setting tailored for their needs.

Athletic Study Hall

Student-athletes may be assigned to an Athletic Study Hall if their grades fall below the district standard. This study hall is designed to give your child a quiet work environment and access to additional resources to support academic success.

SOFTWARE SYSTEMS & USER ACCOUNTS

A variety of software systems are used to maintain student information, manage instructional tasks, and support student development. Parents and students alike have access to these systems, and parents are encouraged to establish user accounts for each system and reference the library of tutorial videos to learn how to maximize the use of these systems. The tutorial videos are available on the District 211 website at adc.d211.org/page/7133.

Infinite Campus

Infinite Campus (IC) is used to manage student data such as contact information, attendance, grades, and assessment scores. The IC portal is located at https://campus.d211.org/campus/portal/township.jsp and requires parents to create a unique individualized user account. Account creation requires an activation key and all parents are sent that key during the fall of their child's 8th grade year in anticipation of entrance to high school. Parents of transfer students will receive an activation key upon school enrollment. Parents are discouraged from sharing their IC password with their child since the parent account includes privileges unique to the parent's role. Students have their own IC accounts.



Schoology

The Schoology portal is located at <u>https://d211.schoology.com/login?&school=13690631</u>. This platform helps teachers track, report, deliver, and collect instructional materials. Parents will receive an email early in the school year with details about accessing Schoology, including an individualized username and temporary password. Once in Schoology, parents will be able to see every course associated with their child.

MySchoolBucks

MySchoolBucks is the exclusive system for District 211 parents to make school meal prepayments, as well as make online payments for monetary transactions with the school such as iPad protection plans and repair

costs, student parking permits, and more.

Maia Learning

MaiaLearning is D211's college and career readiness platform that engages students in planning their future. Students can use MaiaLearning to learn about their interests and strengths and explore postsecondary and career options based on their interests. Students can build academic, postsecondary, and career plans, create resumes

and portfolios and manage college applications, letters of recommendation, and transcripts. Community service hours and work experience are entered into Maia Learning to display on a resume and for Harper Promise. Traversa Ride 360

The Traversa Ride 360 mobile app provides secure access to student routing information. Ride 360 provides quick access to your child's routing information, including the bus stop, route, and bus number. Ride 360

can also utilize GPS data to give parents and guardians access to information on where their child's school bus is, the planned bus path, and what time it is expected to be at their scheduled bus stop. School districts may also send notifications to subscribed users.

*All-Age Athletic Passes are good for adult/child admission; however, they are not valid for IHSA playoff games. High School District 211 students are admitted free to football and basketball games with a school ID. Additional All-Age Athletic Passes (\$15 each) are available for purchase through the Pirate Boosters. The Pirate Boosters Membership is required to purchase additional passes.



Basic Membership: \$30 The Basic Membership includes a car decal.

Deluxe Athletic Membership: \$65

The Deluxe Athletic Membership includes basic membership benefits, plus 4 athletic passes*.

Additional Athletic Passes: \$15 each

Additional athletic season passes can be purchased at \$15 each.

Deluxe Theater Membership: \$65

The Deluxe Theater Membership includes basic membership benefits, plus 4 single use tickets to play or musical.

Combo Athletic + Theater Membership: \$100

The Combo Athletic + Theater Membership includes basic membership benefits, plus 4 athletic passes AND 4 single use theater tickets.

- When is the first day of school?
- Classes begin on Monday, August 11, 2025.

Is a school supply list available so my student is fully prepared on the first day of school?

A supply list is not issued for incoming 9th graders. Individual teachers will share details about specific supply items students will need for their classes. Students are encouraged to bring pens, pencils, folders, notebooks, school-issued iPad, and charger on the first day of classes.

How many courses do students take during 9th grade?

9th graders are required to take English, math, science, and Wellness classes. Additionally, 9th graders take two elective courses and have a lunch period in their daily schedule. All 9th grade students are assigned to a study hall period. Parents will be notified if their child is eligible to choose a third elective course in lieu of study hall.

How do students qualify for a third elective?

9th graders who qualify for a third elective will be notified in January. We recommend that all students select an alternate elective choice. Students' elective choices must be finalized by January 31, 2025.

When do students receive their freshmen year daily course schedules?

Official course schedules will be available on the first day of school. Students will receive a tentative schedule during the summer orientations before the start of 9th grade.

My child is interested in athletics. Are there summer camps and when do fall sports begin?

Summer Camps are usually during summer school days. The fall 2025 sports season will begin on August 11.

How do I register my child for an athletic team or extracurricular activity?

Parents use Infinite Campus to register for extracurricular athletic teams, clubs, and activities. Completing the registration process requires the parent to log onto the Infinite Campus Parent Portal first. A menu of options is displayed on the lefthand side of the screen after logging in. Select school store and follow the on-screen prompts to complete registration for the desired team and/or activity.

Where is my bus stop, and what time will the bus pick me up?

Parents can use the *Traversa Ride 360* mobile app to track their child's bus. Please call the Transportation department at 847-755-6798 with any questions about bus service.

Is summer school required?

Incoming 9th graders are individually invited to attend specific courses to assist them in developing the skills necessary for success in high school. The Incoming 9th grade Academy is a mandatory summer program for select students based on their math and English course placement. Notification regarding Incoming 9th graders Academy participation will occur in January. Additionally, students may be invited to attend optional math courses based on their math placement for 9th grade. Math placement is finalized in the spring; students will be notified of their recommended summer math programs at that time.

What is the Wellness class and does my student have to take it?

All 9th grade are required to take Wellness as part of their 9th grade set of courses. Students in the Wellness course split time between a classroom setting where essential concepts are explored and an activity setting where concepts are applied. More information about the Wellness course is available in the *District 211 Curriculum Guide*.

I am not satisfied with my child's results on the placement exam. Can my child retake the placement exam?

Retesting is not available due to exam protocols established by ACT. The placement exam, the PreACT, is not the only factor used to determine a student's placement in core subjects. Teacher recommendations also are considered before specific courses are assigned.

When will my child receive the results of the placementexam?

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Placement exam results will be distributed at Class of 2029 Curriculum Night on December 11, 2024.

Whom should I contact if I have questions about placement test scores, course placement, or other details about my child's transition to high school?

Questions about course placement determinations should be directed to the student services office at 847-755-1626. Student service staff members are available to assist the families of the Class of 2029 so that the high school experience begins on a positive note.


HARPER COLLEGE PROMISE SCHOLARSHIP

District 211 students are eligible to participate in the Harper College Promise Scholarship which provides up to two years (60 credit hours) of free tuition at Harper College upon high school graduation. Students can earn this scholarship by achieving quality grades in their high school courses, by having good attendance, graduating from high school on time



and ready to begin college-level coursework, and by performing community service hours annually. Students apply for this scholarship during the first semester of freshman year and eligibility criteria becomes active during the second semester.
