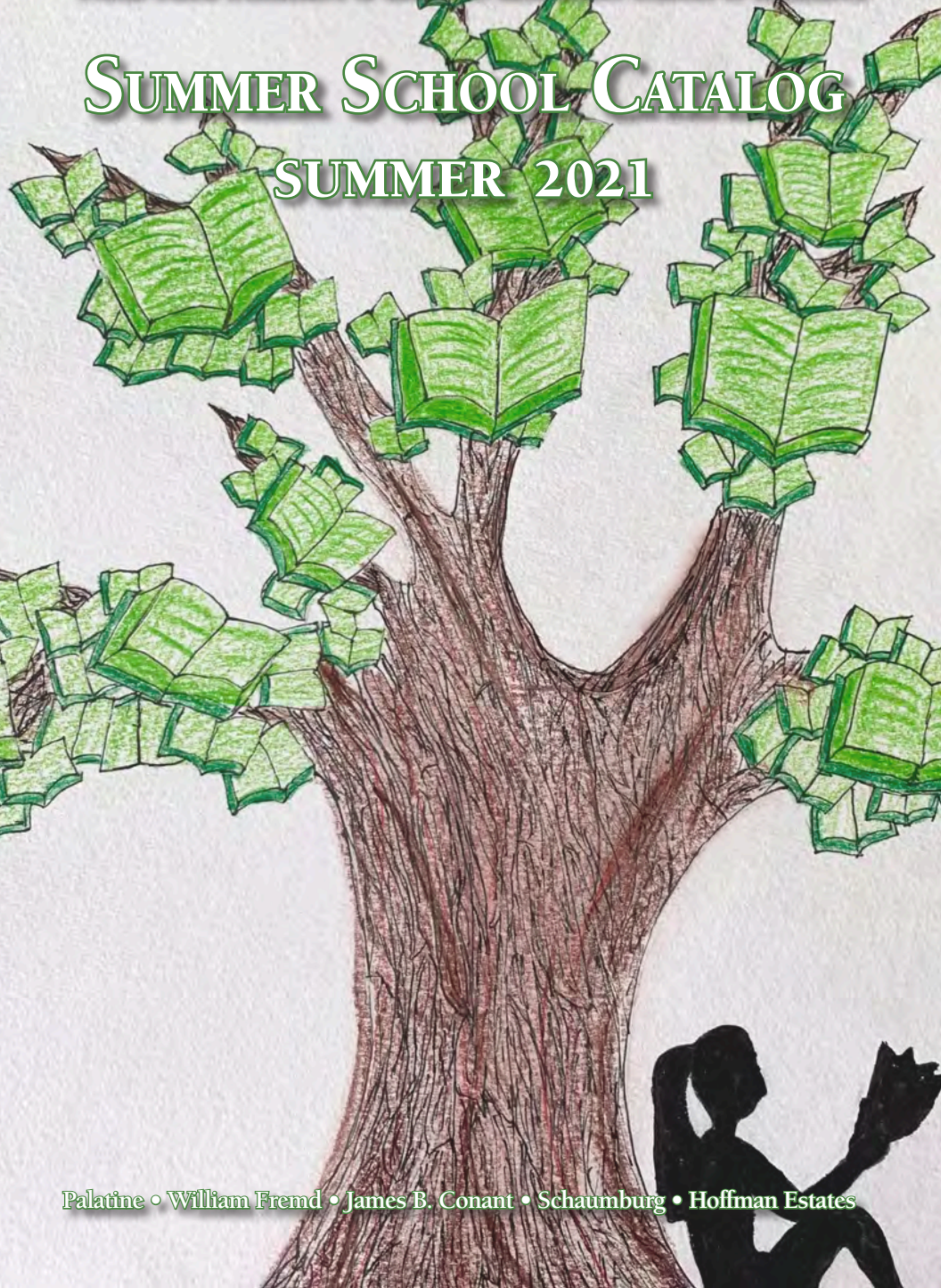

Welcome

Welcome to Summer School!

- In Township High School District 211, we are proud to boast quality programs, exceptional staff, and enriching opportunities for students.
- All students residing in High School District 211 may enroll in our tuition Summer School program.
- Summer School provides opportunities for students to improve academic skills and to explore new interests. It also enables incoming freshmen to become familiar with the high school routine.
- In an effort to transition back into an in-person learning environment, the 2021 District 211 Summer School will be offering courses in a multi-location learning environment.
- This involves having some classes in a remote learning platform, while academy, some specialty classes, driver education, and special education courses will be offered on-site, within the buildings.
- The Summer School schedule will continue as a four-day week Summer School session, with a total of 26 days, 13 days each semester.
- The class time will be 8:00 a.m. – 1:15 p.m. for Palatine and Hoffman Estates High Schools, and 7:15 a.m. – 12:30 p.m. for Fremd, Conant, and Schaumburg High Schools. *Conant High School will have limited use due to construction. Special education classes for Conant High School will be reassigned to Hoffman Estates High School. Most academic classes for Conant High School will be reassigned to Schaumburg High School.
- For courses offered through the remote learning platform, classes will be conducted through Zoom. PLEASE NOTE: **Remote learning courses may be offered in-person if mitigations, and other factors allow.*
- For courses offered on-site in the buildings, students must have to:
 - Complete the *District 211 at-home daily wellness screener* (<https://adc.d211.org/Page/7877>) prior to coming to summer school. Upon coming to Summer School, students must show the response screen with a green check mark to gain entrance. Students' body temperatures will be scanned upon entering the school and students must wear a face mask for the duration of time they are in Summer School.
 - Capacity guidelines also will be enforced in option areas, cafeterias, and during hallway passage.

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- Online registration begins on Monday, April 5 at 7:00 a.m. for Conant, Hoffman Estates, and Schaumburg High Schools, and on Wednesday, April 7 at 7:00 a.m. for Palatine and Fremd High Schools. Please register early. Walk-in registration also is available. Due to ongoing adjustments in health and safety procedures, please check the District 211 website prior to visiting any D211 school or district office.
- For your information, decisions to run most classes will be made by Friday, May 28. Class sizes must be limited, and classes will close when the limit is reached. Classes with insufficient enrollment will be cancelled.
- We hope you enjoy your experience with us, and maximize this opportunity to positively impact students.

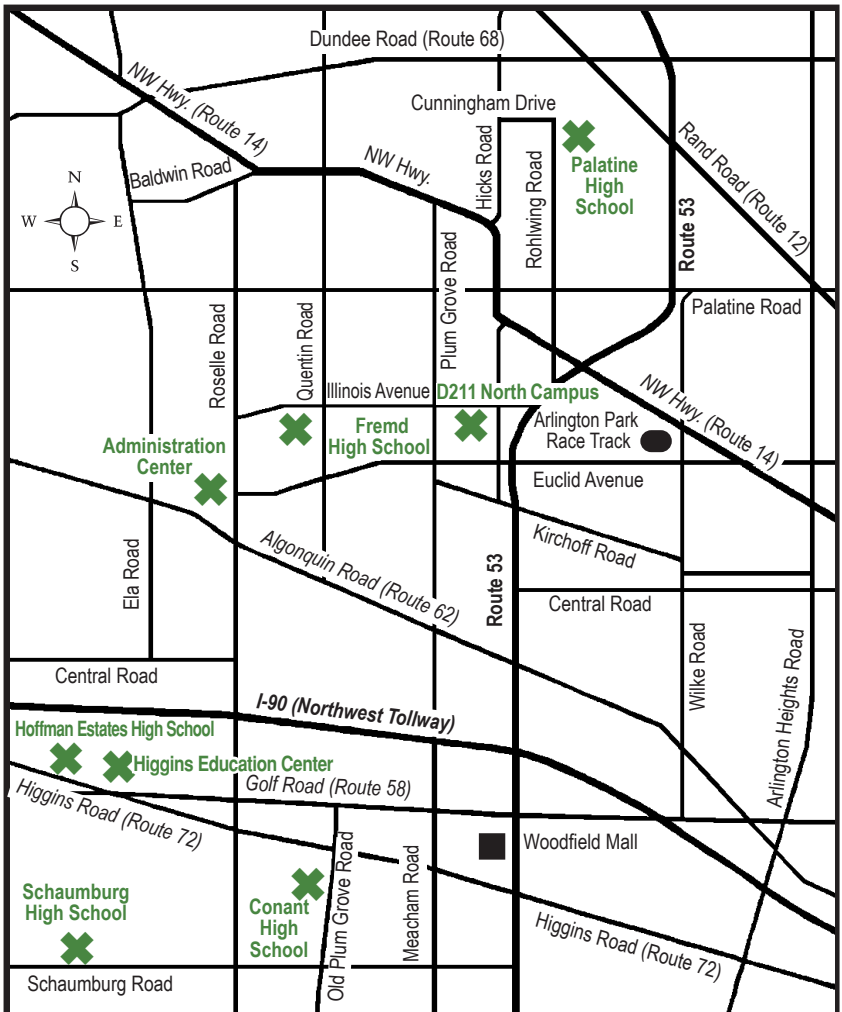

A student who misses the first two days of a Summer School semester will not be allowed to attend class that semester.

Registration:

- In most cases, your child pre-registered their academic class(es) for summer school with their counselor during the regular school year. Please contact the Student Services office at your child's home high school for information on your child's recommended course.
- After doing so, you may use the online system to reserve the course and pay associated fees. If your child is scheduled for a class that requires no fee, **the registration process must still be completed.**
- To register online for summer school course offerings, District 211 parents have the option of using the Infinite Campus Parent Portal. You can access the Infinite Campus Parent Portal through either the District website at adc.d211.org or through your high school's website. To do so, each parent must have a username and password. Your activation key was included with the Parent Portal Activation letter mailed that was mailed in October. If you have lost or misplaced your activation key or login information, you may contact the Student Services office at your high school. For further questions or options regarding your child's summer school courses, please contact your school's Student Services office.

Online:

- **First Semester Registration** – Online registration begins April 5 at 7:00 a.m. for all current freshmen, sophomores, and juniors at **CHS, SHS, and HEHS** and closes at 3:00 p.m. on June 7.
- Online registration begins April 7 at 7:00 a.m. for all current freshmen, sophomores, and juniors at **PHS and FHS** and closes at 3:00 p.m. on June 7.
- **Second Semester Registration** – Online registration begins April 5 at 7:00 a.m. for current freshmen, sophomores, and juniors at **CHS, SHS, and HEHS** and closes at 3:00 p.m. on June 29.

- Online registration begins April 7 at 7:00 a.m. for all current freshmen, sophomores, and juniors at **PHS** and **FHS** and closes at 3:00 p.m. on June 29.
- **Incoming Freshmen Summer School Registration** – Summer School registration begins April 19 for all incoming freshmen. All registration hours and closing dates apply. Registration must be completed through the school the student will attend in the fall.

IF YOUR CHILD DESIRES TO TAKE A SUMMER SCHOOL COURSE OTHER THAN THE COURSES CURRENTLY AVAILABLE IN THEIR INFINITE CAMPUS PORTAL, THE PARENT WILL NEED TO CONTACT THEIR SCHOOL'S STUDENT SERVICES OFFICE.

Walk-in:

Walk-in registration may be impacted due to Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) guidelines. Please check the District 211 website prior to visiting any D211 school or district office.

Parochial school students who live in High School District 211 boundaries may register.

Payment:

After students have met with their counselor and have made course selections, registration can be completed for students at the high school they will attend during the 2021-2022 school year OR online. Online payment is available for District 211 families by using the **Infinite Campus Portal** found on your child's home school's website. Online payment can be made by credit card using Visa, MasterCard, Discover, or American Express. Parents desiring to complete registration online may do so by using the same username and password that has been previously provided. Walk-in and online registrations must adhere to deadlines as stated. Payment for walk-in registrations may be done by cash, check, or credit card.

Transportation:

Students who pay in person for transportation will receive a temporary bus pass upon payment at the school where they register. If payment for transportation is made online, parents will be notified via email when a bus route has been assigned. The student then needs to see their counselor to get a temporary bus pass. A permanent bus pass will be issued to eligible students on the first day of attendance.

General Information

Academic Refund Policy

- Students may receive a 100% refund if they withdraw from a full-tuition academic course **before the first class meeting**.
- Students enrolled in Summer School may receive a partial refund for only the following reasons:
 - Any long-term illness or injury causing withdrawal from Summer School. The refund request must be accompanied by a doctor's verification of the medical condition causing withdrawal.
 - A death in the immediate family.

Academic Courses

(13-day courses)

If request for refund occurs within:

- 1-4 days (2/3 of tuition)
- 5-8 days (1/3 of tuition)
- 9-13 days (No refund)

Drivers Education & Physical Education (Make-up)

(26-day courses)

If request for refund occurs within:

- 1-8 days (2/3 of tuition)
- 9-16 days (1/3 of tuition)
- 17-26 days (No refund)

- Academic refund checks for 1st semester will be issued on or near July 1, 2021, and 2nd semester on or near July 22, 2021.
- **NO REFUNDS WILL BE GIVEN FOR ANY OTHER REASONS.**
- A school administrator and the District Summer School administrator must approve all refunds which will be subject to a review of initial payment. **ORIGINAL BUS PASS MUST BE SURRENDERED TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR A FULL TRANSPORTATION REFUND.** Refund requests missing a bus pass will be delayed until the pass is returned.

Emergency Information

In the event that it is necessary to cancel classes because of an emergency situation, information will be available on the District 211 website (adc.d211.org) or via the news media.

Fees

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, District 211 has reduced fees to families for the 2021 summer session. All fees must be paid in full at time of registration. If paying by check, please make checks payable to "Township High School District 211."

Food Service Options

Meal service will be available during Summer School for students who are participating in on-site or remote learning. Transportation

District 211 school buses will run for morning credit classes, and provide remote learning students access to afternoon activity/athletics only. The route start time for SHS, CHS and FHS activity/athletics will be 12:40 p.m., and for PHS and HEHS will be 1:25 p.m. Transportation will not be available for pick-up of students after activity/athletics are complete. The fee is \$10 per semester. ***Because of irregular schedules, students in driver education classes may not be able to benefit from bus service.***

All students are asked to be at their assigned corner five minutes before the route start time and remain there until the bus arrives. Please contact your school's Student Services office with any bus assignment questions.

Summer School Regulations

Frequently Asked Questions

Summer School is an academic enrichment program for students who desire additional learning opportunities. Time is precious; each day is equivalent to a week of study during the regular school year. Rules are enforced strictly, quickly, and consistently to maintain an atmosphere conducive to learning. *There will be no exceptions made to the rules of conduct or attendance.*

Daily Attendance

What are the attendance rules?

- A student who misses the first two days of a Summer School semester will not be allowed to attend class that semester.
- A student who misses the first two days of a Summer School semester will forfeit all tuition and fees.
- Upon obtaining a third absence (or any combination of absences/tardies equaling three absences), a student will be dropped from Summer School.

- ◊ Do not schedule summer vacations during the Summer School session.
- ◊ Students dropped from class do not receive refunds.
- ◊ To report an absence or ask a question, please call the Summer School office at the school the student is attending.

Tardies

- A tardy of one hour or less is recorded as one-half day of absence; more than one hour equals a full day. Students arriving late or leaving early must report to the attendance office.

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Summer School Regulations (*continued*)

Behavioral Expectations

What kind of behavior is expected?

During the summer, behavior expectations are the same as during the school year. Students may not wear hats and coats in school. Students who use or possess tobacco or controlled substances; are truant or excessively tardy; or commit acts of gross misconduct will be immediately dismissed from Summer School. These students will forfeit credit and fees for the semester.

Are students required to wear I.D.s?

Students are required to wear and properly display a current school I.D. card while attending Summer School in District 211. Student I.D. cards will be distributed on the first day of class. The I.D. card must be worn around the neck and visible at all times during the school day except when specifically exempted on a temporary basis by an authorized faculty/staff member. Only lanyards issued by the school may be used to wear and display the I.D. card. Students may not embellish their I.D. card with any drawing or writing. I.D. cards must be surrendered upon request of any staff member, including bus drivers and student supervisors. The I.D. card must be shown to the staff member on duty when entering buses, checking out media materials, and leaving the school for any purpose. Students without an I.D. card on a school-issued lanyard must obtain a replacement card or lanyard immediately upon entering the building. A fee of \$3.00 may be charged to replace a lost or invalid I.D. card or school lanyard, and a fee of \$1.00 may be charged for each day that a student fails to wear the I.D. card to school. Further disciplinary consequences may apply for failure to properly wear and display a current I.D. card.

Are electronic devices allowed?

Students are permitted to possess electronic communication devices (e.g. cellular telephones, pagers, personal digital assistants, or any hybrid communication device) while on school property. “School property” includes the school building, parking lots and grounds, and school-owned vehicles. ***However, all non-instructional devices must be turned off and stored out of sight (backpack, purse, not visible to anyone) during school hours.***

Academic Expectations

What are the study requirements?

Students should expect a great deal of homework each day. Absentees must turn in missed work immediately upon their return to school.

What is the final examination policy?

A student who is absent on the last day of the semester will not be allowed to take the final examination and will not receive course credit. In addition, the student will forfeit all fees for the entire semester and receive a failing grade by default. Final examinations will be given during the last two hours of class. ***Final examinations will not be given early.***

How much credit does a course earn?

Students receive one-half unit of credit for each semester of an academic course. Driver education courses and physical education earn one-quarter unit of credit for the course.

What does “audit” mean?

Students may apply to audit a course. A notation will appear on the school record that the student attended the course and received no credit. Audit students pay full fee and must adhere to the same attendance guidelines. Audit forms are obtained from the Summer School principal.

T27203/T67203 Networking: IT Fundamentals

Platform: *Remote

1/2 unit of credit

Level: All

This course provides students with a hands-on introduction to operating systems and related concepts. Includes hardware, software, file systems, directory structures, files and attributes, text editors, applications and, maintenance. Compares and contrasts GUI and command line interfaces in a variety of current operating systems. *Students must have a Harper College ID. T67203: Harper College Course NET 105*

Art

A15303 Art

Platform: *Remote

1/2 unit of credit

Level: All

This course is the equivalent to the first semester of Painting, Drawing, and Printmaking 1 offered during the regular school year. Students will learn the basics of drawing, color, and design through a variety of projects and materials.

A19503 Digital Media Arts 1

Platform: *Remote

1/2 unit of credit

Level: All

Digital Media Arts 1 is the beginning level course and introduction to digital arts and imaging. Students will begin to learn key concepts and basic skills involving digital photography and imaging, digital illustration/vector, graphic design, raster/bitmap imagery, virtual worlds, motion graphics, and game design. Lessons will be geared towards learning tool and technique basics using industry standard software such as Photoshop, Illustrator, Final Cut Pro, and Unity as students investigate the essentials of interactive media. No experience necessary. This introductory semester course is suggested as a pairing with the introductory semester course *A196 Video and Animation*.

Schaumburg High School — 1st Semester

A90203 Photography

Platform: *Remote

1/2 unit of credit

Level: 2, 3, 4

Prerequisite for level 1: *Department chair or teacher recommendation.* This enrichment course in black and white photography features cameras, composition, and darkroom techniques and may include digital photography. Students must purchase supplies at their own expense and must have access to a 35mm black and white camera. This course may be used in place of *Photography A255* as a prerequisite for *A355 Photo II* during the regular school year.

Fremd High School — 1st Semester

Schaumburg High School — 1st Semester

A90303 Building an Art Portfolio

Platform: *Remote

1/2 unit of credit

Level: 2, 3, 4

Prerequisite: *Placement in Art Studio or AP Art Studio classes in the upcoming school year.*

This course will prepare current or incoming art studio students to better meet the challenges and expectations of building a personal art portfolio. This portfolio can

be used for college and scholarship application as well as submission to the College Board for AP Art Studio. This summer course is designed to improve the student’s ability to (1) conduct a sustained investigation through practice, experimentation, and revision, guided by questions; (2) skillfully synthesize materials, processes, and ideas; and (3) articulate, in writing, information about one’s work. During this course, students will be led through various studio projects that will help stimulate and improve these skills.

Business Education

B28503 Consumer Education

Platform: *Remote

1/2 unit of credit

Level: 2, 3, 4

Students will receive instruction in budgeting, savings and investing, credit, insurance, comparison shopping, banking, income taxes, and consumer protection. As referenced on page 10 of the Summer School Catalog, students should expect at least two hours of homework each day. Out of school Internet access to accommodate the accelerated curriculum schedule is required. This course fulfills the Consumer Education graduation requirement.

All Schools — 1st or 2nd Semester

Driver Education

P90203 Driver Education (Behind the Wheel & Classroom)

Platform: On-Site

1/4 unit of credit

Level: 2, 3, 4

To enroll in this program, students must be 16 years of age by September 30, 2021. **All students must have a valid Illinois learner’s permit prior to the first day of class.** State law requires that all students must have received a passing grade in eight courses during the two semesters prior to enrolling in driver education. Both classroom and behind-the-wheel instruction are offered. Seats are limited in all sections. **Early registration for this course is essential.** Only residents of High School District 211 are eligible for this course.

Those who do not attend a District 211 high school during the regular school year must register at the G.A. McElroy Administration Center, 1750 S. Roselle Road, in Palatine, and bring a copy of their birth certificate and verification of academic eligibility. (Obtain this form from your own school’s administration.)

Because of irregular schedules, students may not be able to benefit from bus service.

Key Dates:

April 26, 2021

First day students can go to Student Services to get a permit application

May 5, 2021

First day students can return to Student Services with a valid permit and request a seat for the course. After the seat request is processed, parents must pay for the course prior to the section being assigned. As seats are limited in each time slot, students will be able to rank the order of their preferred time slot and location when turning in their valid permit.

The goal of this six-week special education course is to accelerate student learning, strengthen academic preparation for the high school curriculum, and to help the student acclimate to high school.

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sense and conceptual understanding of pre-algebra concepts. This project-based classroom will use manipulative experiments, cooperative groups, and technology to enhance student learning. At the end of the program, students will be retested for placement into *Algebra I*.

R92703 Incoming Freshman Academy Reading (by invitation only — mandatory attendance)

Platform: *On-Site*

1/2 unit of credit

Level: 1

This **mandatory** three-week course is designed to strengthen skills needed to be successful in high school and to become life-long readers. This intensive course focuses on improvement in reading fluency, comprehension, critical thinking, writing, and vocabulary. A variety of reading strategies will be taught through the use of short stories, novels, and nonfiction selections.

R90403/R90503 Freshman Project Excel (by invitation only)

1 unit of credit

An efficacy-trained instructor will work with the teacher in the classroom to help students develop skills to reach their capacity as a student and as an individual.

This course is suggested and open to all students enrolled in M117 Algebra 1 or M147 Advanced Algebra 1 during their freshman year of high school. This course also is available in an online classroom format (see M927).

M92703 Preparation for Algebra 1 (by invitation only) — Online

Platform: **Remote*

1/2 unit of credit

Level: 1

This course prepares students for a successful first year of high school algebra by refining the prerequisite skills needed for algebra. Students work from home to complete self-paced units within the six weeks of the Summer School calendar. Students may email a mathematics teacher with individual questions throughout the six weeks of the online course. Students must attend a one-hour class the first week of Summer School (multiple options are available) to receive their software passwords. Students also must attend a 90-minute class the last week of Summer School (multiple options are available) to take the final exam in person. Students must have access to the Internet to participate in this course. The date and time options will be sent directly to students enrolled in the course by May 15 (prior to full refund deadline).

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This course is suggested and open to all students enrolled in *M117 Algebra 1* or *M147 Advanced Algebra 1* during their freshman year of high school. This course also is available in a traditional classroom format (see *M917*).

Online course is open to all schools – Course must be completed within the six weeks of Summer School.

M99203 Preparation for Geometry (by invitation only)

Platform: On-Site

1/2 unit of credit

Level: 1, 2

This course is open to incoming freshmen or sophomores who would benefit from instruction in complex algebra skills. This course prepares students for *M217 Plane and Solid Geometry* and *M218 Accelerated Geometry*. Department chair or junior high school recommendation required. ***This course is offered for regular academic credit.***

M99303 Preparation for Algebra 2 (by invitation only)

Platform: On-Site

1/2 unit of credit

Level: 1, 2

This three-week mathematics course is designed to strengthen geometry and algebra skills needed for success in *M328 Accelerated Algebra 2* and beyond. This course is open to incoming freshman or sophomore students who would benefit from instruction in complex algebra and geometry skills. This course prepares students for *M328 Accelerated Algebra 2*. ***This course is offered for regular academic credit.***

1 unit of credit

Level: 1

R93603 Sophomore Academy Mathematics (by invitation only — mandatory attendance)

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manipulative experiments, cooperative groups, and technology to enhance student learning. At the end of the program, students will be retested to determine their sophomore year mathematics course placement.

All Schools — 1st or 2nd Semester

R93703 Sophomore Academy Reading (by invitation only — mandatory attendance)

Platform: *On-Site*

1/2 unit of credit

Level: 2

This **mandatory** three-week course will focus on improving student reading fluency, comprehension, critical thinking, writing, and vocabulary. A variety of reading and writing strategies will be taught through the use of short stories, novels, and nonfiction selections.

Sophomore Invitation Courses

R95503 Sophomore Project Excel (by invitation only)

1 unit of credit

Level: 4

This work/study evening course includes classroom work and on-the-job experience. Students receive 1/2 unit of credit for classroom work and 1/2 unit of credit for work experience. **Students must be employed and have completed 8 semesters of high school.** Attendance during the first class meeting is mandatory. This course meets the consumer education graduation requirement (6 weeks).

Students who are in the process of learning the English language will continue to improve their listening, reading, speaking, and writing skills through this course. Students are placed in the appropriate level of *ESL Academy* based on recommendation only. Students attend a three- or six-week course that prepares them for the Illinois State Access Test and ESL Level 3.

R94401/R94402 ESL Academy English — Advanced Level C

(by invitation only — mandatory attendance for freshmen/sophomores)

Students are placed in the appropriate level of *ESL Academy* based on recommendation only. (by invitation only — mandatory attendance for freshmen/sophomores)

This course is designed to refine listening comprehension, oral language, reading, and writing skills needed for English language proficiency. Students are placed in the appropriate level of *ESL Academy* based on recommendation only. Students attend a three- or six-week course that prepares them for the Illinois State Access Test and ESL Level 5.

All Schools — 1st or 2nd Semester, or both

R94603 ESL Academy Mathematics I

(by invitation only — mandatory attendance for freshmen/sophomores)

Platform: On-Site

1/2 unit of credit

Level: All

This course provides necessary support to students in need of accelerating their progress towards algebra readiness. Students will study topics aimed at increasing their number sense and conceptual understanding of pre-algebra concepts. The project-based classroom will use manipulative experiments, cooperative groups, and technology to enhance student learning. At the end of the program, students will be retested for placement into *Algebra I*.

All Schools — 2nd Semester

Palatine High School — 1st Semester Only

R94703 ESL Academy Mathematics

(by invitation only — mandatory attendance for freshmen/sophomores)

Platform: On-Site

1/2 unit of credit

Level: All

This course provides necessary support to students in need of accelerating their progress towards meeting state standards in mathematics. This project-based classroom will use manipulative experiments, cooperative groups, and technology to enhance student learning. At the end of the program, students will be retested to determine placement for the fall semester mathematics course.

College Major & Career Cluster Exploration Courses

R95101 Interactive and Information Technology I: Principles

Platform: On-Site

1/2 unit of credit

Level: All

Do you like creating images or games on a computer? Do you have a technical and creative mind? This pathways exploration course allows students to investigate possible college majors and career pathways by introducing students to a variety of essential skills for the Information Technology professional. Students will explore Computer Information Systems, Software Design and Development, Visual Design, and Hardware Design and Control Systems. This project-based, hands-on course will help students determine a focus in Interactive and Information Technology and provide them with skills needed for all paths in the field.

R95202 Interactive & Information Technology II: Digital Design & Development

Platform: On-Site

1/2 unit of credit

Level: All

Prerequisite: Interactive and Information Technology I: Principles.

This second technology pathways exploratory course focuses on design applications using the skills received in the Principles course. Advanced topics such as microcontroller programming, sensor priority, animation, and web connectivity will enable students to develop a product design for presentation at the end of the course.

T94601 Building Construction I

Platform: On-Site

1/2 unit of credit

Level: All

While building a project on the high school campus, students will become familiar with stages of

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construction from site preparation to interior finish work. This may include the following skills: carpentry, siding, roofing, drywall, electrical, plumbing, heating, painting and staining, and various flooring applications. All tools are provided by District 211. ***This class is open to all District 211 students. Students attending a south-end high school must provide their own transportation.***

Palatine High School — 1st Semester

T94702 Building Construction II

Platform: *Onsite*

1/2 unit of credit

Level: *All*

This course is a continuation of the project being built first semester in *T946 Building Construction I*. While continuing to build a project on the high school campus started first semester, students will become familiar with stages of construction from site preparation to interior finish work. This may include the following skills: carpentry, siding, roofing, drywall, electrical, plumbing, heating, painting and staining, and various flooring applications. Students are not required to complete *T946 Building Construction I* prior to enrolling in *T947 Building Construction II*. All tools are provided by District 211. ***This class is open to all District 211 students. Students attending a south-end high school must provide their own transportation.***

T93601 Diesel Technology

Platform: *On-Site*

1/2 unit of credit

Level: *All*

A fundamental course designed to increase the knowledge of diesel engine design, fuel control systems, forced induction, and emission controls. Use of both classroom and lab will occur to demonstrate competencies. ***This class is open to all District 211 students. Students attending a south-end high school must provide their own transportation.***

R95403 Stagecraft and Entertainment

Platform: *On-Site*

1/2 unit of credit

Level: *All*

This course gives students the opportunity to study the technical aspects of the entertainment industry and what goes on behind the scenes of a concert, festival, or theatre production. Students get hands-on experience in multiple areas of technical theatre, such as theatrical lighting, sound design/engineering, costuming, stage makeup, stagecraft, and scene design. Skills acquired also could help with future jobs in entertainment, film, music, major athletic events, and theatre, and with home improvement projects, decorating, interior design, painting, construction, fashion, makeup, and more.

W69103 Introduction to Human Diseases (Dual Credit)

Platform: **Remote*

1/2 unit of credit

Level: *4*

Prerequisite: *Successful completion of Chemistry (S332, S338, S439) or Medical Terminology (R613)*

This course provides an introduction to common disease states and their treatments from a pharmacist's perspective. It includes hands-on activities related to patient assessment and education regarding these diseases. The course is designed to allow students to explore the role of the pharmacist as a member of the healthcare team. Knowledge of high school biology is assumed. Students will take three field trips to Roosevelt University in Schaumburg during the Summer School day to complete lab activities. Roosevelt University professors teach this course. *Students must have a Harper College ID.*
