Presentations

It has been the longstanding commitment of District 211 to provide safe, functional and adaptable facilities that contribute to the educational program and have a positive impact on student achievement. As a component of its financial and operational goals, the District's long-range capital outlay plan is designed to align with its Strategic Plan and building utilization, improvement and maintenance schedule and serve educational goals. The District is completing routine maintenance and life-cycle replacement updates, completing projects in its 10-year capital improvement plan and completing mandated life safety projects identified on the 2019 Health and Life Safety Survey. The District's capital plan is reviewed and updated annually to reflect progress and considers changes due to financial, conditional, technological, or energy-related matters.

Chief Operating Officer **Lauren Hummel** and Director of Facilities and Purchasing **Rickey Sparks** presented a life safety capital improvement projects summary and financial update, as well as the 10-year facilities and capital improvement plan. Also presented was information on 2023-2024 major capital improvement projects, 2023-2024 routine maintenance capital projects, future facility improvement considerations, financial planning for capital improvements.

Approval of Minutes

Enrollment Projections

The Board received information on enrollment projections through the 2030-2031 school year. Projections are based on fall data received from Districts 15 and 54, and assume attendance boundaries as defined in October 2001, with no significant shifts of families within the District. The projections are based on students who will attend the District's five high schools. Off-campus projections are based on enrollments at District 211 North Campus, Higgins Education Center, and private facilities for the 2020-2021 school year and a five-year average for the remaining years. Not included in the projections are the number of students who may enroll in District schools based on their families specifically moving into District 211 boundaries for its educational excellence.

Projections indicate the District's enrollment across the five high schools will rotate between increasing and decreasing for the next few years. Enrollment is projected to continuously increase starting in 2028 and continuing through 2031.

Graduation Livestreaming Services for the Class of 2023

District 211 high schools have a long history of having formal and dignified graduation ceremonies. In 1996, District schools began hosting graduation ceremonies off school grounds to offer greater spectator capacity. The NOW Arena is a multi-purpose cultural and sports center that can accommodate all five large high school graduation ceremonies.

The Board previously set graduation dates and times at the NOW Arena.

The Board now has approved a license agreement with NOW Arena at a total cost of \$8223.08 to livestream all five Class of 2023 graduation ceremonies.

One-to One Program and Electronic Device Purchase

For the past nine years, District 211 has provided each student an iPad as part of the District's one-to-one program. The program has become a fixture of the District's instructional model and earned recognition by Apple for the efficient and effective integration into students' learning experiences. The one-to-one program provides students with on-demand access to classroom and course content resources while supporting their participation in authentic problem-solving experiences, enabling immediate teacher feedback, and increasing opportunities for collaboration with classmates.

The one-to-one program is designed around a four-year device life cycle. Each student is assigned an iPad as a freshman and keeps that same device for the full four-year high school experience. Upon graduation, the senior has the option to purchase the assigned iPad at current market value. iPads not purchased by graduating seniors are retained for possible use during placement testing of 8th graders in the fall, as placement testing may be moving to a digital platform. Any iPads not used will be sold to a third-party vendor. Revenue obtained from the sale of used iPads to third-party resellers and graduating students is used to offset overall one-to-one program costs.

The Board approved the purchase of 4,300 iPads from Apple at a total cost of \$1,264,200, and 4,400 cases from UZBL at a total cost of \$101,200 to support the one-to-one learning program during the 2023-2024 school year.
